Students entering ninth or 10th grade in the fall of 2009 are encouraged to apply to The Ohio State University Summer Enrichment Program to be held June 15-19. The OSU Summer Enrichment Program is being offered by The Department of African American and African Studies Community Extension Center.

The theme of the one week enrichment program is "Following the Freedom Trail: African Americans in Family and Community". The program is designed to provide students with an appreciation for and an understanding of African American cultural and historical study as well as an opportunity to develop famil-

iarity and proficiency in the use of computer technology.

Program activities will begin at 9 a.m. and end daily at 5 p.m. Lunch, snacks and all educational materials will be provided. Academic classes will be taught by instructors from the OSU Department of African American and African Studies. The curriculum will include local and out-of-town field trips to sites such as the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center in Cincinnati.
