Clark Metro Development Corporation moves forward

At the Thursday May 21" meeting of Clark Metro Development Corporation (CMDC), the Board of Trustees hired Adam Umek as Office Manager. Board President Jack Gordon Fine says Umek will provide a face for the community to associate with organization. Umek who has put in many hours as a volunteer helping to revive Clark Metro Development Corporation, is already familiar with the development corporation's programs, staff and volunteers.

Board President Fine says CMDC has filed the necessary 990 IRS forms to keep its 501c3 status up to date and is working on an audit. The organization has submitted the proper paper rk to Cleveland Housing Netw (CHN) and will continue to work with CHN to provide Emergency HEAP, PIP and Housewarming Program services in the neighborhood.

CMDC Home Energy Assistance Program Intake staff person Lothario Marchmon says the organization helped over 12,000 people apply for the Emergency HEAP and Percentage of Income Program this past winter. He says Emergency HEAP is available to help people making up to 175% of the federally defined poverty line (\$18,500 for a single individual and \$37,100 for a family of four). The PIP program is available those making up to 150% of the fed-eral poverty line. The HEAP Intake number at CMDC is 518-4014. Walk in appointments are also available daily from 9-11 am and 1-3 pm at the CMDC office in Room 303 of the Lin Omni Center, 3167 Fulton Road.

Fine says CMDC is working with CHN to add an intake person to its staff to help increase the number of energy audits being done by the Housewarming Program. People with incomes up to 200% of the poverty line now qualify for the Housewarming Program. The Housewarming pro-gram helps households that qualify, insulate their homes. For information on how to apply for the program call

Fine noted that CMDC signed a o-vear lease for its offices at the Lin Omni Center, reduced its office expenses substantially and is poised to begin building its bank account with those savings and new revenue. The Board of Trustees is preparing to lease a lot it owns to a day care organization in the neighborhood

looking for parking.
Fine also hopes to increase revenue from the Housewarming Program by recruiting more neighborhood esidents to participate in the program and adding two more independent contractors to help residents insulate their homes. Fine says he is not sure

how much revenue the Housewarming Program will generate.

The new Clark Metro Development Corporation, says Fine, will have boundaries that parallel those of the newly created Ward 14. Brookside Park will serve as the organization's southern boundary. Proceeding north the eastern boundary will be Pearl Road and W. 25th Street up until the I-71 Metro curve. From there, proceeding north the Freeway will serve as the eastern boundary up to Kenilworth Avenue, Proceeding west on Kenilworth, the northern boundary goes along Willey to Walworth Avenue From there it proceeds west along the Walworth/Train Avenue corridor to W. 41st. South on W. 41th to Clark, Clark to W. 46th, South on W. 46th to Oaklay Ave, Oaklay to Kouba. The Eastern boundary proceeds south along W. 52nd to Denison and from Denison to W. 56th, finishing just south of Denison at W. 56th

This summer Fine says CMDC will hire two groups of ninety youth to work in its service area. The first group will begin in June and work 5 hours a day for six weeks helping to spruce up the neighborhoods in the CMDC service area. Fine says the youths will help paint over graffiti, clean up open fields, and record street bulb lights that are out. Youth Opportunities Unlimited and Cleveland State University are sponsors of Clark Metro Development Corporation's Summer Youth Program, says Fine. The program is seeking adult volunteers to help supervise the youths while they work in the neighborhood Interested adults can call the CMDC office at 741-9500.

In addition to the Summer Jobs Program, CMDC will host a Life Skills and Parenting Group for young women ages 16-20 every Wednesday from 6:30 - 9 p.m. at the Clark Metro offices in the Lin Omni Center. Jack Gordon Fine's son, Jonathan Fine of Scranton Road Baptist Church, will run the program.

Local financers have toured the Clark Metro Ward 14 area with members of the CMDC Board of Trustees and were appalled with what they observed, says Fine. He says the financiers are willing to partner with CMDC to provide grants to help meet the needs of neighborhood residents.

CMDC is looking for grant writers that are willing to work on commis-sion to help the organization seek additional funding, says Fine. Interested individuals should contact Jack Gordon Fine at CMDC.

Residents and stakeholders in the Clark Metro neighborhood are welcome to attend the weekly board meetings. Meetings are held every Thursday at 6 p.m. at the Clark Metro Development Corporation Office in Room 303 of the Lin Omni Center 3167 Fulton Road.
