

Inseous people die in use fires. Sadly, those who live a house fire often lose their four-legged family members to the smoke and fire. According to the US Fire Administration's website ([www.usfa.dhs.gov](http://www.usfa.dhs.gov)), more than million uncontrolled fires occur annually in the US. The Administration does not tally, but other groups have estimated that more than 0,000 pets are killed by house fires each year. Why are we so bad at saving human lives, but our pets seem to perish? One potential answer is the absence of smoke alarms in our homes. For more than 30 years, vs have required the presence of these life-saving devices in every home or apartment. In fact, Public/Private Fire Safety Council has called for an elimination of residential fire deaths the year 2020 and smoke alarms figure prominently in our plan. But the high pitched alarm that saves so many human lives is not helpful for saving our pets. We all realize that it's time evacuate when the alarm sounds, but our pets don't know that. Worse yet, the unknown and could scare a pet into hiding, increasing our own risk for fire, as we search for the missing kitty or pup.

And, the sad fact is that many pets will die in house fires because they are unable to get out of the home. This often happens when the family is away. Rescue personnel are frequently aware of pets needing help. The heroic efforts of firefighters may save some pets from the flames, but damage from smoke or carbon monoxide inhalation can overhelmy. Life-saving equipment, such as oxygen masks, is usually designed for people meaning me animals may die enroute the veterinarian.

Fortunately, many diverse groups are working to improve survival chances of pets of the year.

### File for Unemployment Compensation Benefits

Can I receive unemployment benefits?

You can receive unemployment benefits if you lose your job for one of these reasons:

- LACK OF WORK — You can receive benefits if you are LAID OFF by your employer. You may be able to receive partial benefits if you are getting fewer hours.
- DISCHARGED WITH-OUT JUST CAUSE — You can receive benefits even if your employer has the right to fire you if you can show that you were without fault and did not commit misconduct.
- QUIT FOR JUST CAUSE — You can receive benefits if you can show that a reasonable person who wanted to remain employed would have quit under the circumstances, and you can show that you made reasonable attempts to resolve the problems with your employer before quitting.

How do I file for unemployment benefits?

You can file for unemployment benefits by calling 18776446562. Or, you can apply online at: <http://unemployment.ohio.gov>. This site is available 24 hours a day and also contains links to The Workers' Guide to Unemployment Compensation, Frequently Asked Questions, and information about how to find a job. What happens after I file an application for unemployment benefits?

You and your former employer will complete fact finding forms about the reason why you are no longer working. The unemployment agency will use these responses to determine whether or not your separation allows you to receive benefits. If you do not understand the questions, call the "Processing Center" that issued the notice and ask for clarification.

to receive benefits. Otherwise, you may be able to receive benefits if you still qualify based on your most recent covered employment.

How do I receive benefits?  
Benefits are paid by direct deposit or by debit card. You will be able to choose which option you prefer. The agency no longer issues paper checks.

What happens if I am denied benefits?  
If you are denied, you must file your appeal within the 21-day appeal deadline stated on your notice, or you will lose your right to appeal.

If you file an appeal, the agency will then send questions to the employer and will issue a "Redetermination". If you disagree with the Redetermination, you could then have a Hearing. You can contact Legal Aid for assistance with filing appeals and with seeking assistance with hearings. Contact our office as soon as you know you have a problem!

How many benefits will I receive and how much will I receive?  
Usually, you can receive 26 weeks of unemployment benefits in a "benefit year." Currently, there is a Federal extension called Emergency Unemployment Compensation (EUC) available, providing an additional 33 weeks of benefits.

• If you work at all during the week, you MUST report the amount you earned! If you fail to report this information correctly, you can be charged with fraud.

• You will be asked if you are working and how much money you earned during the week in which you filed your claims.

• You may be denied if you do not have high enough wages in covered employment or because of the reason you lost your job.

• If you disagree with the Determination, you must file your appeal within 21 days from the date the notice was issued. Your former employer also has the right to appeal.

How do I receive benefits?  
1. File weekly claims by telephone or online.

• You will receive a New Claim Instruction Sheet and a notice containing a Personal Identification Number shortly after you file your application.

• You should read these papers closely. They will explain how you file your weekly claims.

• The papers will be sent to you by a "Processing Center" assigned to you. If you have questions, call the phone number on this notice!

• You will only receive benefits for the weeks that you file.

• You will be asked if you were able, available, and actively seeking work during the week. You will only receive benefits for the weeks that you are able to answer "Yes" to these questions. If you answer "No", you will receive a questionnaire that will ask for more information that will ask for more benefit.

How do I file to start a company but it failed; can I get unemployment benefits?  
If you paid into unemployment benefits, you may be able to receive Social Security benefits; can I receive unemployment as well?

Yes. Social Security benefits are no longer deducted from unemployment benefits.

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


