## Society gets grant for clinic

The Legal Aid Society of Cleveland has received a \$65,000 grant from the Internal Revenue Service to continue its Low Income Taxpayer Clinic during 2005. The society's clinic, one of seven in the state, will help low-income taxpayers involved in disputes with the IRS and educate people for whom English is a second language on tax rights and responsibilities. The federal grant program, now in its seventh year, encourages the creation of clinics across the country. The IRS awarded about \$7.5 million in grants for 2005.
