Celebrate Watershed Week

Litter cleanup, water sampling and a boat tour will be part of the third annual Euclid Creek Watershed Week event, Tuesday through Saturday, Sept. 17. This year's theme is "Back to the Future - Explore the Past, Understand the Present and Realize the Future of Euclid Creek." Events will stretch over five days to provide different experiences to learn, help out and explore the watershed, which touches 11 eastern Cuyahoga and Lake county communities before emptying into Lake Erie. Events start Tuesday with "Introduction to Building a Rain Garden," a program from 6 to 8 p.m. at Mayfield Regional Library, 6080 Wilson Mills Road. Descendants' Day Saturday

The Soldiers and Sailors Monument Support Group will present Descendants' Day from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Saturday at the Cuyahoga County Soldiers and Sailors Monument, 3 Public Square. Speakers will include several descendants of Civil War soldiers discussing their ancestors listed on the monument walls. There will be a dedication of new Civil War items, including a fife, sharpshooter's eyeglasses and new Civil Warera flags. The free event will include music, cake and ice cream, and monument tours.

Not getting special education

The first month of testing students at the Juvenile Detention Center for learning disabilities found that 24 of 30 likely need special education they have not been receiving in the Cleveland schools, Juvenile Court attorney Mark Majer said Thursday. Court officials plan to present the findings to the schools and insist on more testing and followup, citing federal laws that require school districts to provide learning disabled students with individualized education plans.
